

CHAPTER ONE: INTRODUCTION

1.1 Background of the Study

Community policing is a modern law enforcement strategy that emphasizes collaboration between the police and the community in addressing crime and maintaining public order. It is based on the principle that effective crime prevention requires active participation from both law enforcement agencies and the public (Skogan, 2006). Unlike traditional policing approaches that focus on responding to crime after it occurs, community policing promotes proactive engagement, trust-building, and shared responsibility.

Globally, community policing has been widely adopted as a means of improving police–community relations and reducing crime (United Nations, 2011). In developing countries, however, its implementation is often constrained by limited resources, institutional weaknesses, and socio-economic challenges (Brogden & Nijhar, 2005). In Malawi, community policing was introduced by the Malawi Police Service as part of broader reforms aimed at enhancing public safety and improving trust between the police and citizens (Malawi Police Service, 2018).

The Malawi Police Service has established various community policing structures, such as community policing forums, neighborhood watch groups, and victim support units. These initiatives are intended to encourage information sharing, crime reporting, and joint problem-solving (Chasukwa, 2014). However, despite these efforts, crime remains a significant concern in many parts of the country.

Mtakataka, a trading center in Dedza District, has experienced various forms of crime including theft, burglary, assault, and gender-based violence. Factors such as poverty, unemployment, and limited access to education have contributed to criminal activities in the area (UNDP, 2020).

This study seeks to examine the current state of community policing in Mtakataka and explore strategies that can strengthen its effectiveness in crime prevention.

1.2 Problem Statement

Despite the introduction of community policing initiatives by the Malawi Police Service, crime rates in Mtakataka, Dedza District, remain relatively high. The expected partnership and cooperation between the police and the community have not been fully realized, resulting in weak collaboration in crime prevention and maintenance of public security.

Many community members are reluctant to share crime-related information with the police due to mistrust, fear of victimization, lack of confidentiality, and limited awareness of their role in supporting community policing efforts (Skogan, 2006). In addition, the police face operational challenges such as inadequate funding, shortage of personnel, insufficient training, and limited transport and logistical support, which negatively affect effective community engagement and service delivery (United Nations, 2011).

Furthermore, some community policing structures in Mtakataka are either inactive or poorly coordinated, reducing their effectiveness in preventing crime and promoting public participation in security matters. As a result, criminal activities continue to threaten the safety and wellbeing of community members despite the existence of community policing programs.

An effective community policing program can contribute significantly to crime reduction, improved public trust in the police, enhanced information sharing, and stronger cooperation between law enforcement agencies and community members. It can also promote peaceful coexistence, increase community participation in security matters, and create a safer environment that supports social and economic development within the area.

Although community policing has been widely promoted as an effective crime prevention strategy, limited studies have specifically examined the challenges affecting its implementation in Mtakataka, Dedza District. Therefore, this study seeks to investigate the factors hindering effective community policing and to propose practical strategies for strengthening collaboration between the police and the community in order to enhance crime prevention in the area.

1.3 Objectives of the Study

1.3.1 General Objective

To examine and strengthen community policing as a strategy for effective crime prevention in Mtakataka, Dedza District.

1.3.2 Specific Objectives

1. To assess the current community policing practices in Mtakataka.
2. To identify the challenges affecting the effectiveness of community policing.
3. To evaluate the level of community participation in crime prevention activities.
4. To propose strategies for improving community policing and reducing crime.

1.4 Research Questions

1. What community policing practices are currently implemented in Mtakataka?
2. What challenges hinder the effectiveness of community policing in crime prevention?
3. To what extent does the community participate in policing activities?
4. What strategies can be adopted to strengthen community policing in Mtakataka?

The study focuses on community policing and crime prevention in Mtakataka, located in Dedza District. It examines the interaction between the police and the community, identifies existing challenges, and explores possible solutions. The study targets police officers, community leaders, and residents within the area.

1.7 Limitations of the Study

- **Financial Constraints:** Limited funds may restrict data collection and coverage.
- **Time Constraints:** The study is conducted within a limited timeframe, which may affect the depth of analysis.
